
King's Crowned the Winners

Their score was submitted to the Institution of Engineering and Technology and once they have completed all the challenges this year, the top five scoring teams will get entered into the final. Last year the 'Faraday Challenge Days' involved three hundred and twenty seven schools across the UK, with the National Final held at Land Rover Bar HQ in Portsmouth. Last year, the top five school teams received an all-expenses paid trip to the final, where they all competed for a cash prize of up to £1,000 towards Science, D&T and Maths equipment for their school. 
The Christmas Bauble Challenge

Examinations

In some subjects, particularly those with a practical element, Year 11 students are currently engaged in trial examinations. These are very important as they inform staff and students of strengths and weaknesses prior to taking GCSEs. Revision for these examinations is paramount.

Students who under-perform through lack of effort will have enforced revision and will have to resit the examination. Year 8 also have examinations week commencing 8 January. These are an important aid to preparing for KS4 courses and making option choices in the Spring Term.

Some Years 10 and 11 students will have important public examinations week commencing 8 January in Cambridge National Health and Social Care, Sports Science, Music, Leisure and Travel & Tourism BTEC.
