#### Who wants to be a millionaire?

#### I do!

This was the question posed to students in years 7 and 8 in September, when The King's School began using Accelerated Reader. This computer based reading package encourages students to read regularly and often, by incorporating fun quizzes in to the reading process.

As GCSE examination papers are written for an average reading age of fifteen years, it is vital that students are encouraged and motivated to read in a way that increases their vocabulary knowledge, and their reading comprehension skills.

Initially, all KS3 students sit a Star Reader assessment, which tells them which ability range of books they should be reading. Students begin reading at the lower end of this range in order to increase their enjoyment of reading, as they should be able to read most of the words on a page without having to de-code them first. It also allows them to better understand what they are reading, rather than merely reading the words. Once a book has been read, students then take a quiz on the computer, aiming for 85% accuracy; they are delighted if they achieve 100% as they receive an e-praise sticker.

The sophisticated software programme also logs how many points have been earned from each book quiz, as well as how many words have been read. The literacy team work with each group of students, giving weekly feedback and updates of progress towards targets. Over the past few weeks, students have been having weekly Accelerated Reader lessons, where they can choose books from the school library, and then take quizzes on the computer once they are read.

The school has also introduced a weekly Drop Everything And Read session, which provides a quality quiet time for everyone (students and teachers) in school to read for 30 minutes each week. This, combined with five homework sessions of reading for twenty minutes each day, means that students are eating-up books with an insatiable appetite rarely seen before (as reflected in the year 7 and 8 figures above). Consequently, students have begun to achieve their first round of targets that have been set. Parents will receive a text message informing them when their child has achieved their target, as well as a recognition postcard. There is also a Home Connect facility which enables parents and students to view their progress from their home computer.

We are delighted with the students' response, and are especially pleased to announce our first two 'word millionaires'. Brogan M has read and banked 1 066 702 words, and Duncan H has read and banked 1 069 355 words! Keep it up!
