

As I write this final entry for the newsletter at the end of an academic year, it's difficult to comprehend that we've reached the end of a school year. There has been so much positive change in both secondary schools and I'm extremely proud of the work that staff and students have put in to achieve what we have. I'd also like to thank parents for their patience, when so much change is going on it's difficult for some to understand 'why?' until tangible results are achieved. The Ofsted report at Carleton, the examination results this summer, improved attendance and a huge drop in exclusions at both schools are validation of our work, and whilst we know that our work has only just started, there is so much to celebrate. I'm particularly proud of the amount of support we put in place for our Year 11 students this year, there have been countless residential, after school and weekend support sessions, and I'm not sure the staff could have done any more for them. I am equally proud of how the students have conducted themselves, we asked them to meet us half way, and they did, plus more.

When I first arrived last year, both secondary schools worked in isolation and there was very little collaborative work. Carleton needed to improve quickly and King's was in danger of underperforming. Both schools now work really closely together, and there are genuine opportunities for the schools to share good practice and support one another. King's has a new leadership team, a new found energy and drive, and there is a real purpose to the culture there. Carleton is completed transformed and unrecognisable from the school I arrived at last May, and the one described in the Ofsted inspection in 2017. The behaviour in both schools is a real strength. Teachers can really concentrate on delivering excellent lessons, and students are able to focus on their learning. I genuinely believe both schools are on a trajectory to be outstanding schools, and I'd be happy to send my three children to either school.

Our mantra of Culture + Consistency = Excellence continues to be at the heart of everything we do, which means we don't put a ceiling on what our students can achieve. We aim to be consistent in our approach to everything we do, so our standards are always high. We want our students to have as many opportunities open to them as possible when they leave us, regardless of starting point or background. Whilst examination results are incredibly important, they are only one part of a jigsaw. In September we launch a new curriculum which will ensure that we are widening our students' knowledge, deepening their cultural awareness, helping them become more rounded individuals and developing their communication skills. We are also investing in our support systems for students around mental health. On Monday and Tuesday, key members of staff were trained by Mental Health First Aid England, so they can be advocates and support our youngsters with all the pressures on young people in the modern world. It is an area of growing concern, so we wanted to make sure our front line staff are well trained.

I hope you have a wonderful summer, and I'm very much looking to working with staff, students and parents in September.

For those of you that have visited the school in recent weeks for the various events we have had, you will have noticed significant work being done on the physical learning environment. Some areas of the school have been more akin to 'DIY SOS' of late and this has seen old displays being removed and new stylish subject display boards ready to be implemented in September. All classrooms are being decorated, new furniture has been ordered and we are on the way to modernising all areas of the school so that students have the best deal possible. It is important to add that whilst the above is needed and exciting to see, it is important to strike the

right balance so that we retain the history of the school and build upon the successes of the past.

I continue to be amazed by the efforts of all staff with regard to the events and trips that we give our students the opportunity to be involved in. You will see much more detail over the following pages, but cultural capital is such an important element of education and giving the students the chance to experience things that extends beyond their curriculum is vital. The last time I wrote for the newsletter I promised high standards and an unwavering commitment to achieving the very best for our students. There will be various changes to classes next year with students in all years being in groups that reflect where they are on their learning journey. I am confident that this will allow for a more individualised approach and for students to maximise their potential.

Thank you once again for your contribution to The King's School this year. I look forward to working with all students and stakeholders during the next academic year. I genuinely believe that we can do great things and put the school back to where it belongs, in both the local area and nationally.

MY EXPERIENCE ON A JAPANESE EXCHANGE BY RIO YOUNG

If you go to any country you will find yourself in an unknown, unfamiliar world; it is rather exciting, as you have many interesting places to explore whether you are on holiday or on business. I had the wonderful opportunity to travel abroad and go to a school in Japan for 10 months. While there, I attended lessons, camps, company visits along with all my classmates. I stayed with four wildly different host families who supported me and gave me varied perspectives about life in Japan.

I attended "Kanagawa Prefectural Kanagawa Sogo-Sangyo Senior High School", unofficially known as LiSA (Liberal Arts and Science Academy). It was not like a normal Japanese school in many ways, particularly as it was a Design and Technology specialist school. My school had 700 pupils with 3 years. I was in 1-7, or 1st Year - Class 7. My class was smaller than most with 30 students, with normal classes being around 35 - 40 students. Unlike most Japanese schools, I chose which subjects I could take, similar to the UK. They had over 60 choices, from Home Economics to Car Engineering, Music to English Business Communication. I chose some easy subjects like English and Music but also hard ones like Geography and Chemistry to give some variety and challenge to my school life.

A major part of Japanese school life are clubs; in the UK clubs are usually extra-curricular activities that are not integral into your school experience. Whereas, in Japan, joining a club is the best way to make friends with similar interests and almost all the students joined one club.

My school's culture festival was during the weekend, lasting for 2 days. The whole school year, up to this point, builds up to this event in October. Every form makes a stall, some cook food like pizza, some perform plays, some even make horror mazes in a

classroom. Every club also has the opportunity to showcase the activities they have done to parents, friends and teachers. Many of the drama, dance and band groups have the chance to perform on the stage as well. It is very exciting and a tremendous amount of fun. My class chose to make kakigori (shaved ice) as it was still around 20-30°C. Unfortunately, as the festival started, a typhoon made its way towards Japan, meaning many people didn't want to buy our shaved ice. Despite this, it was amazing, the comradery and spirit of our stall was inspiring.

My Japanese exchange was not all spectacular though, I spent roughly 3 hours going to and from school always having to take a bus ride, then a train, then a 15 minute walk to my school, rain or shine. This was particularly, troublesome during rainy season, where it rains continuously for 1 month. Despite the rain it was still 25°C so I could not wear a coat to school. So, you could see me perspiring, with an umbrella in my hand, as buckets of rain fell from the sky.

The best part about the exchange was the ability to improve my Japanese language skills, and to expand my world view. I made many friends while I was there, some, I hope, I will have forever. When I was preparing to embark on this journey to Japan, I was nervous, I was scared, but now I'm back home, I reflect on my time there. Although there were many things I regret not doing, I am truly grateful for the opportunity. It helped me grow into the person I am and taught things I would never learn in school. And, I would go again if the opportunity arises again in the future. I would say one thing to anyone who gets the chance to do anything interesting, difficult, unique; Do it. Do it now! It may be difficult now, but it might also change your life, and open up new avenues for you to go down in the future.

MATHS CHALLENGE AWARD

20 of our students recently took part in the UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge and we have some winners! Seven students have received bronze certificates and one student has received a silver certificate, putting him in the top 19% of entrants, out of 270,000. This is a fantastic achievement – well done to all students!

On Wednesday 22 May, Mrs Copley from Farmer Copleys visited our Year 9 Hospitality and Catering students to discuss the benefits of eating local produce including seasonal foods. Students got to taste a range of dishes including seasonal asparagus, sausages, lemon cakes, bread and local honey from their new working beehive.

Following this event, students were invited to visit Farmer Copleys on 3 July, where they visited the farm shop, dining facilities and got to see behind the scenes in the kitchen. Students sampled a variety of foods including gelato, freshly picked strawberries from the fields and local cheeses. 


DofE TRAINING

All students will be required to have all school uniform items with the new logo following the one year grace period we provided last year.

Over the course of the year we have had many queries around skirts and issues have been raised by parents around the challenges of purchasing the correct one. In order to address this we have taken the decision to implement a logoed skirt which will be mandatory from September 2019. This will be available from our local suppliers in a variety of lengths to ensure consistency. Skirts should be knee length.

Due to feedback from girls we have also introduced a fleece to the PE uniform, instead of a rugby shirt, which we believe will be practical and favoured more by the girls than the rugby shirts they currently wear. This is an optional item for girls. Boys must continue to wear the rugby shirt.

To support parents / carers in ensuring that the uniform items that you have purchased meet our expectations, we will be holding a "Uniform Checking Session" where, if you wish, you can come into school with the uniform that you have purchased and we will check it meets our uniform expectations before the start of the school year. The date of the session is Thursday 22 August 11.00 – 13.00.
