A MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

As the calendar year draws to a close, I would like to take this opportunity to update you on the progress we have made at The King's School since September. You will see over the following pages the vast array of extracurricular events that our students have partaken in this academic year so far, and I am sure you will agree that our students continue to be a credit to you, the school and the wider community. I have mentioned before how important it is to me and for all staff to maintain the reputation of The King's School and to enhance this further through events such as these - you would have to travel far and wide to find an equal rival with regard to the opportunities students have outside their academic studies.

You will know by now that we operate 'simple systems' executed with precision'. It is no exaggeration to say that if what happens in the classroom is right and students feel supported from a pastoral point of view we will not go too far wrong. There has been much work done with regard to teaching and learning and all staff remain engaged in high quality continual professional development on a weekly basis. To give you a flavour of some of the work done, we had an excellent session on 'growth mind-set' and the importance of resilience in all we do. This was repeated for the students and reinforced the message that life can be challenging at times but we all pull together to overcome any barriers we may face - especially important for those in Year 11 who have just completed their mock exams. The students have conducted themselves in an exemplary manner and have risen to the challenge. They are understandably ready for a rest now and we will have undoubtedly provided you with tired teenagers for the festive season!

Significant changes that have been made over the last 12 months are now coming to fruition and it is pleasing to see new systems being genuinely embedded and a daily 'norm'. I am aware that change can cause questions being asked by parents/carers - and rightly so - but it is rewarding to see excellent behaviour in lessons and around school and any low-level disruption being eradicated. Allowing teachers to teach and students to learn is key and has a significant impact on both culture and outcomes. It is genuinely an exciting time for secondary schools as we look to improve our curriculum. We have spent time looking at metacognition (a fancy teacher word for learning about how we learn!) and ensuring that we embed knowledge for our students. Whilst there is no getting away from terminal exams at the end of their courses, it is crucial that they engage with their subjects and develop an understanding that extends beyond the end of Year 11.

It has been a busy term and I know that all students (and staff!) are ready for a break as a reward for all their hard work. From a wellbeing point of view, it is important that students have a rest and recharge batteries over the Christmas period and are ready to go again in January. Compassionate rigour is our mantra and I know that we will all return in the new year refreshed and working to the same high standards and expectations.

As always, I thank you for your continued support and on behalf of all at The King's School, I wish you a very Merry Christmas and a peaceful new year.

This year we marked Remembrance with two wonderful assemblies. We were supported by many representatives from the Ackworth and Pontefract branches of the Royal British Legion. As always it was an absolute pleasure to welcome them into our school to what is an annual and important event in our diary.

This year, we focused on the theme of 'Remembering together'. The assemblies reflected on the integral efforts of war heroes from all walks of life and cultures; exploring the important themes of unity, collaboration and determination.

Our extremely talented school orchestra and choir were applauded for their inspiring and emotive rendition of 'Homeward Bound'.

Mr Brian Berry and Mr John Gardner (of the Royal British Legion) shared wonderful poems and personal stories with the students and staff; it really was a privilege to have such special guest speakers.

Mrs Carrington (KS3 Leader), Mrs Buckingham (Curriculum Leader of Music) and Miss Marshall (Acting Curriculum Leader of English) organised and delivered the two assemblies. Students learned from Mrs Carrington the importance of World War II and how we could not have achieved success without our many allies. Mrs Buckingham planned, organised and conducted the huge ensemble of musicians and Miss Marshall spoke about how much students already knew about war and conflict, reinforcing a lot of their previous learning.

Alice Toon and Daniel Heald, who are our Head Girl and Head Boy, delivered important speeches on the heroes of the Empire. Students, William Johnson and Harry Hewlett introduced an evocative video from the school's WWI Battlefields Tour to Belgium. The video was recorded by Hannah Walker and Lizzie Warner and they perfectly captured the highlights of the school trip. Mr Pinto, Head of School, shared important stories and pictures documenting how war impacted the people of Pontefract.

All our students conducted themselves in an exemplary and dignified manner and the assemblies were beautifully delivered. We would like to extend a huge thank you to everyone involved.
