I write to you at the end of a hectic, but extremely rewarding and positive first term. As I said in my previous letter, it has been great to have some normality back to school life. I would like to provide you with an update on the following:

Rugby Coach & Development Officer, and Staffing Changes

I am pleased to announce that we have recently appointed Mr Tony O'Brien to a new position at the school, a Rugby Coach & Development Officer. Mr O'Brien will join us in January. Now that we have been able to operate more normally, we are very much looking at re-establishing our proud tradition. We understand the importance of rugby for the school, particularly rugby union, and I am passionate about ensuring that we maintain our heritage in the future. Mr O'Brien brings with him a wealth of experience and is qualified to a Level 3 standard, has a Masters in Sports Performance Coaching and has coached at a professional level for a range of clubs. These include Connacht in Ireland for rugby union and also as a league coach, working with Castleford, Warrington, Widnes and Hull KR throughout his career. We welcome Mr O'Brien and are excited as to what he will bring on the training field for all year groups, for boys and girls, and also to see him implement his ideas around game analysis.

As at the end of most terms, we will also see some staffing changes and welcome a new Lead Practitioner of Maths, Mr Paul Thomas, who will add strength to the department, as well as a new Teacher of English, Miss Katie Hill.

Breakfast Provision

Continuing our work with our catering suppliers, we will be reintroducing our breakfast provision from Monday 10 January. This was not possible throughout Covid-19 restrictions and we have maintained our separate year group 'zones' upon arrival to school each morning. Breakfast will be available for all students from 8.30am.

Rewards

Our Achievement Points system that we introduced in September has been a great success. In the first term, the ratio of Achievement Points to 'Consequences' has been 10:1 and it is lovely to see our students being rewarded and recognised for their great work and behaviour. Co-Curricular Offer
